it does.



SAN MARCOS----Southwest Texas State University is offering a unique scholarship program titled "University Scholars" to incoming freshmen and junior college graduates.

Under the program, seven scholarships are offered worth \$1,000 a year each for up to four years. Selection is based primarily on scholastic potential and achievement rather than on financial need.

High school seniors and junior college sophomores desiring to apply for a University Scholarship should write to Dr. Ralph Harrel, Associate Vice President, SWT, San Marcos, Texas 78666.

The latest date for requesting information is March 1, 1982. Counselors have been mailed application post cards. Completed applications must be received by March 12, 1982.

When applying, students should list their intended major. Failure to list intended major could lead to a week's delay.

Some interviews may be conducted on the Southwest Texas campus after the April 1 deadline.

The University also offers a number of freshmen scholarships worth \$150-300. March 15, 1982, is the application deadline for these scholarships. SWT's Student Financial Aid Office handles the freshmen scholarships, in addition to toher scholarships and other forms of financial assistance.

Because of the great confusion the Christmas shoppers create, criminals have many unsuspecting victims to choose from. They follow people to their cars and attack them in the parking lot, or follow their targets to their home. Though many couples have been attacked, most people who are attacked, have been shopping alone.

Many cases of auto burglary have occured! at malls. If you bring packages back to your car, and plan to continue shopping, make sure you store them in the trunk; leaving purchases in your backseat invites auto burglars.

The most dangerous shopping center in Houston is Greenspoint Mall, a popular place for shoppers at Cypress Creek. Because of the poor lighting and large parking lots, criminals can take advantage of the potential victim. Be-cause of the traffic around the mall, you

could be followed and not even know it. problem just isn't at Greenspoint, it has spread to all the malls.

When you go shopping, there are a few tips which might make it safer for you:

· Try to go shopping in the daylight hours if possible.

· If you go at night, make sure you go in

pairs.

If at all possible, NEVER go alone even in the daytime. Most robbers don't have 9 to 5 jobs. Males and females have both been attack-

·Always place your purchases in the trunk of your car. Don't invite auto burglars.

Be wary of cars who follow behind you. Many couples have been followed home, burglarized, the woman has been raped, and the car been stolen.


And I said, "But Santa brought it!" And he said, "No-Daddy did-not Santa." I cried."


Girls Romp Past Spring
