Surprisingly enough, few nations celebrate Halloween as we do. In Ireland, a large parade by Kirsten Howard

assembles and begs for food in honor of their God, Muck Olla. In Scotland, a parade of torchcarrying citizens wanders through the towns lighting fires on the hills to drive away witches and evil spirits. Welsh people each mark a stone and toss it into a large bonfire. f a person's stone is missing in the morning, if a person's stone is missing in the morning, the person can expect to die within the year. In England Mallowern is often called Nutcracker fight or Snap Apple Night because it is customary for the family to sit around the fire, telling stories and eating apples and nuts. In the U.S.A. Hillowern was not celebrated until the 1800's besseld of our early religious beliefs. Our customs include dressing up to trick-or-tract, besseld for apples, telling ghost stories, and naving our fortunes told.

The winners from these NBAA races advance every August to a 56 acre site, just outside of New Braunfels, Texas for the annual Armadillo Alympics.

- f. Keep dillo in dark places.


TIPS FOR ARMADILLO OWNERS



Why are the parents of the Cypress Creek lower classmen nervously pacing the floor awaiting their children's safe arrival on the night of October 31? The reason: Halloween is a dangerous night

The number of trick or treat related accidents has grown enormously over the past five years. Every Halloween more and more children are taken to the hospital from poisonings, car wrecks, hit-and-run accidents and other occurances, caused by careless drivers and psychopaths.

A little known fact discovered by these reporters is that vendors sell more eggs around Halloween than any other season (except Easter). Egging is great fun until you discover your egg has hit the wrong person. Then this becomes a dangerous sport when you try to drive away and hit 800 little trick or treaters who are in your way, or leaping over a six foot fence only to find a vicious dog, who hasn't had his dinner awaiting your arrival. 

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
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
