Mary is a ten year member of Girl Scouts. Sorry, she doesn't sell cookies! She is also i in campainers, which is part of Younglife.





After going by Matzke and Bleyl, the parade continued down Grant Road and back to Cypress Creek, students filled the stands of the Junior Varsity football field to watch as the floats moved around the track. The pep rally was then moved into the gym, due to rain. The Silverado officers performed their halftime routine, followed by a cheer by both the Varsity and Junior Varsity cheerleaders. It was a cold and wet pep rally, but the weather didn't dampen anyones spirit.

Coogs Pluck 16th Ranked Falcons

Going along with the homecoming activities, the Cougar gridders scored an impressive

victory over Jersey Village 16-7.

Jersey Village, the area's 16th ranked 5A team, only crossed midfield once, and obtained a mere 110 yards offensively. The Falcons only score came with 10:10 left from a pass interception and a 13 yard pass from quar terback Kevin Richards to end Al Pawelek.

The Cougars rallied for 63 rushing yards

The Cougars rallied for 63 rushing yards and 98 passing, compliments of quarterback Scotty Lee. Mike Hamilton started the excitement as he bolted 45 yards on the opening kickoff Yet Creek scored first, right before half time, as Scotty Lee capped a 46 yard drive, by executing a 2 yd. run across the line. This score was set up by a 22 yard pass from Lee toBrian Walters. Al Olveido kicked the extra point to make it 7-0 at the half.

The Cougars picked up an easy 2 pts. as the Falcons center sent the ball sailing over the quarterbacks head and into the end zone. Creek scored again with 3:54 left, as Bryan Walters caught Lee's pass for 12 yards on

fourth down.

This win boosted the Cougars season record to 4-3, and 4-1 in district, their only district loss being to Conroe.






