## Expanding the Creek

Although many students on the first day of school mistook the chain-link fences, which surround parts of the school, as a new measure to prevent them from leaving campus, they are actually there for the protection of the student body, the faculty, and visitors to Cypress Creek. Construction has been going on since early August, and fences were put up to keep people away from these extremely hazardous areas, except for employees of the Cahaba Construction Company and McKittrick Richardson Wallace Inc. Workers are busy building the additions that are expected to be ready for occupancy in September, 1983, and cost over \$3.8 million.

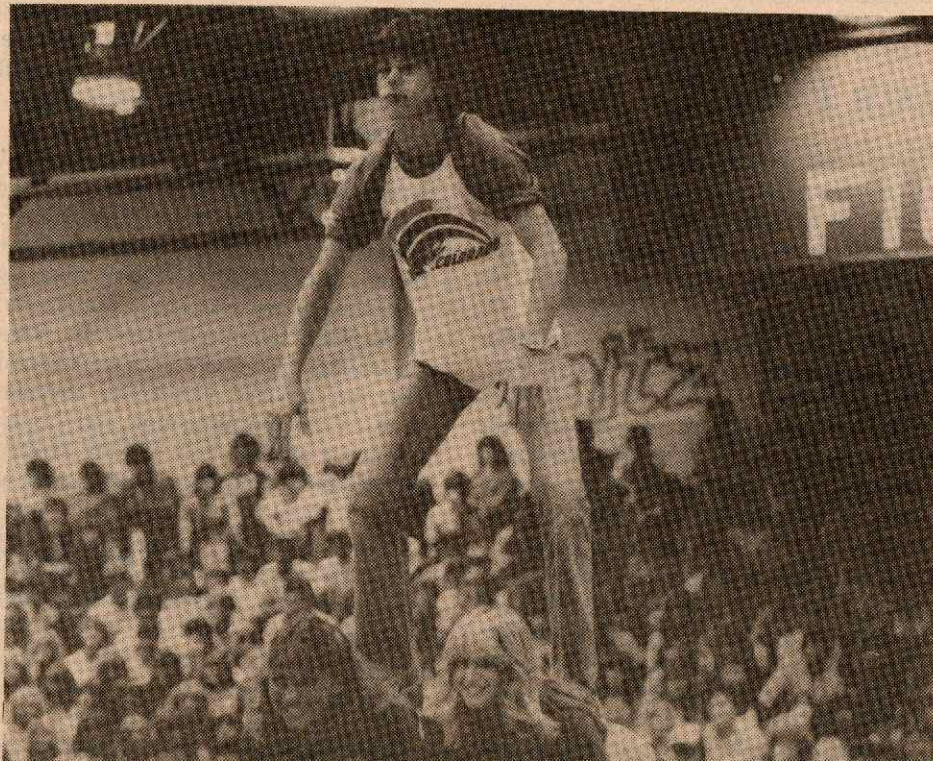
The majority of the new building will be devoted to classrooms, but a new commons area and an addition to the vocational wing are also scheduled for construction. Other changes involve the existing assistant principals' offices, which will be moved next to the library, and the gyms, which will have air-conditioning next year.

Many people have wondered why construction was begun in August and not earlier in the summer when normal school procedure would not be interfered with. Mr. Shelton explained that the process of building or expanding a school is a long and involved process; construction of this degree usually takes over a year to com-

plete. The new fourth high school is not expected to open its door until the 1986-87 school year. Student capacity at Cy-Creek is being extended from the present enrollment of 2460 to 3200

with a predicted 3000 students attending the Creek in the future. It has been rumored for sometime that next year's freshmen will be staying at their respective junior highs in-

stead of moving on to high school. Mr. Shelton described this rumor as "absolutely untrue". There will be freshmen at Cypress Creek next year.

The University of Houston charges the upcoming graduates up to \$2800 per year to live in a dorm with a first payment of \$250.

Apartments near the campus are not much better. Beall Village, located at 4464 N. MacGregor Way, charges \$280 per month for a one bedroom apartment not to mention a deposit of \$100 for utilities.

Cougar Apartments, located at 5019 Calhoun Rd., charges \$300 per month. That includes the deposit.

Just in case your apartment or dorm is broken into, it might be a good idea to have renters insurance. \$208 per year will give you \$10,000 coverage, the least amount most agencies will insure.

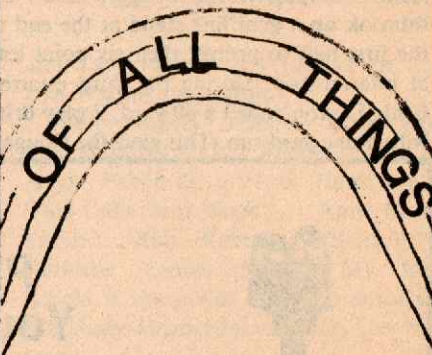

Though staggered by several key injuries on the defensive line, the Cypress Creek Cougars are heading into district looking strong. Under the guidance of second year Coach Les Koenning, who led the Cougars to a 5-5 season last year, the Cougars have shown the capabilities of a strong offense and a strong defense.

The offense has looked good under starting senior quarterback Ernie Layton, who has proven he can move the team with authority. Joe Dryer will also see some action. The running game is lead by starting seniors Mike Hamilton and Barry Stewart. Junior Scott La Baume will also see a lot of district action this year. The offense line is anchored by senior center Matt Elliot and a tandem of talented tackles including Bo

Sloan and Chuck Manicom. Senior tight end Alan Champagne looked great against Northbrook and Nimitz making several good catches. He will be joined by Ted Lewis, Bret Cline, Sean Mullen, and Chris Menegay to fill out the receiving core.

The Cougar defense looks solid this year, led by senior middle-guard Wayne Schilleci, who has had two fumble recoveries and several key tackles in the first two games.

## Defense Devours Nimitz

The Cy-Creek Girls Volleyball team is warming up for district by playing their first three scrimmages of the 82-83 season.

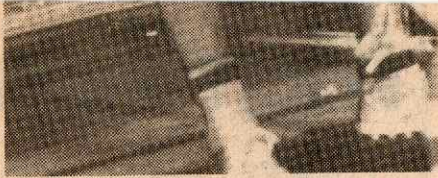

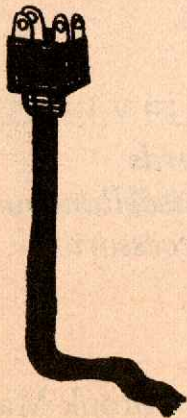
## Drenched :Cougars Lose Heartbreaker

In a rain drenched home opener, the Cougars lost a heartbreaker 13-12 against Northbrook, though the Cougars played well for the first game of the 82-83 season.

The Cougars jumped out to a 6-0 lead on an 81 yard, 14 play drive, capped by a ten yard pass from Ernie Layton to tight end Alan Champagne. The Cougars held Northbrook on a goal line stand at the end of the first half to protect their six point lead at intermission. During the third quarter, Ernie Layton ended a 60 yard, 7 play drive with a one yard run. This gave the Cougars

a 12-0 lead with 1:10 left in the third quarter.
